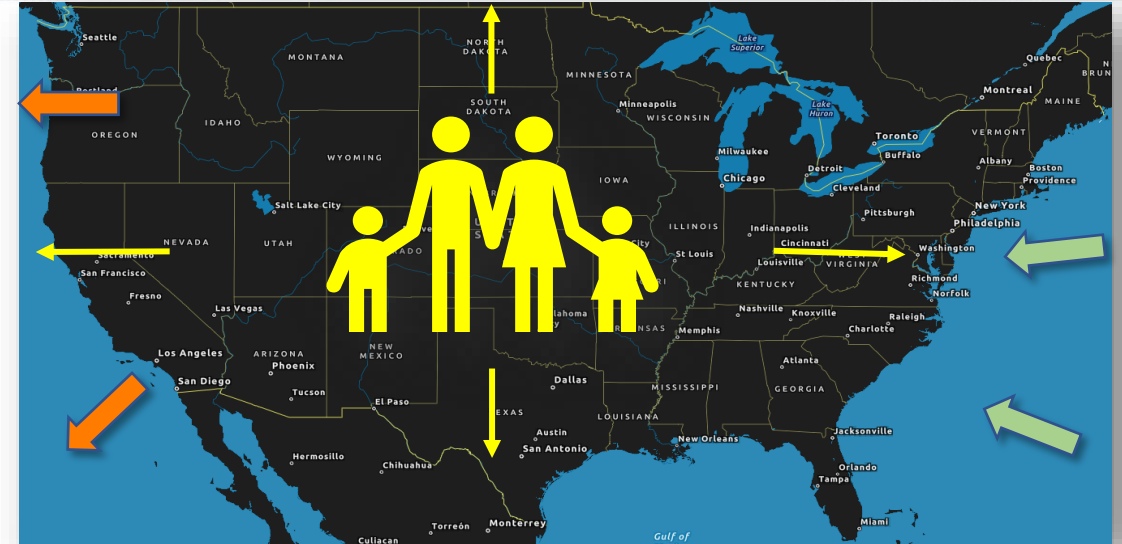


How Domestic Migration is Measured

- Every year, the Census Bureau's Population Estimates Program (PEP) measures population change since the date of the last decennial census using administrative records and other data.
- Population changes for a given geography result from a combination of natural change (the difference between births and deaths) as well as international and domestic regions.
- The domestic migration measure represents a net – the difference between in-migration and out-migration. An increase in net migration over time can occur because more people are moving in, fewer people are moving out, or a combination of the two. A decrease in net migration is the opposite due to increased outmigration, a decrease in-migration or a combination.

- The net domestic migration is the difference between in-migration (the number of people moving in or a positive net migration) and outmigration (the number of people moving out or a negative net migration) during a migration period.
- The Census typically measures migration from July 1 of one year through June 30th of the next (e.g., July 1, 2021 to June 30, 2022 which represents the 2021-2022 migration period).
- In other words, domestic migration is the movement of populations that occur during a specified period of time within the United States.

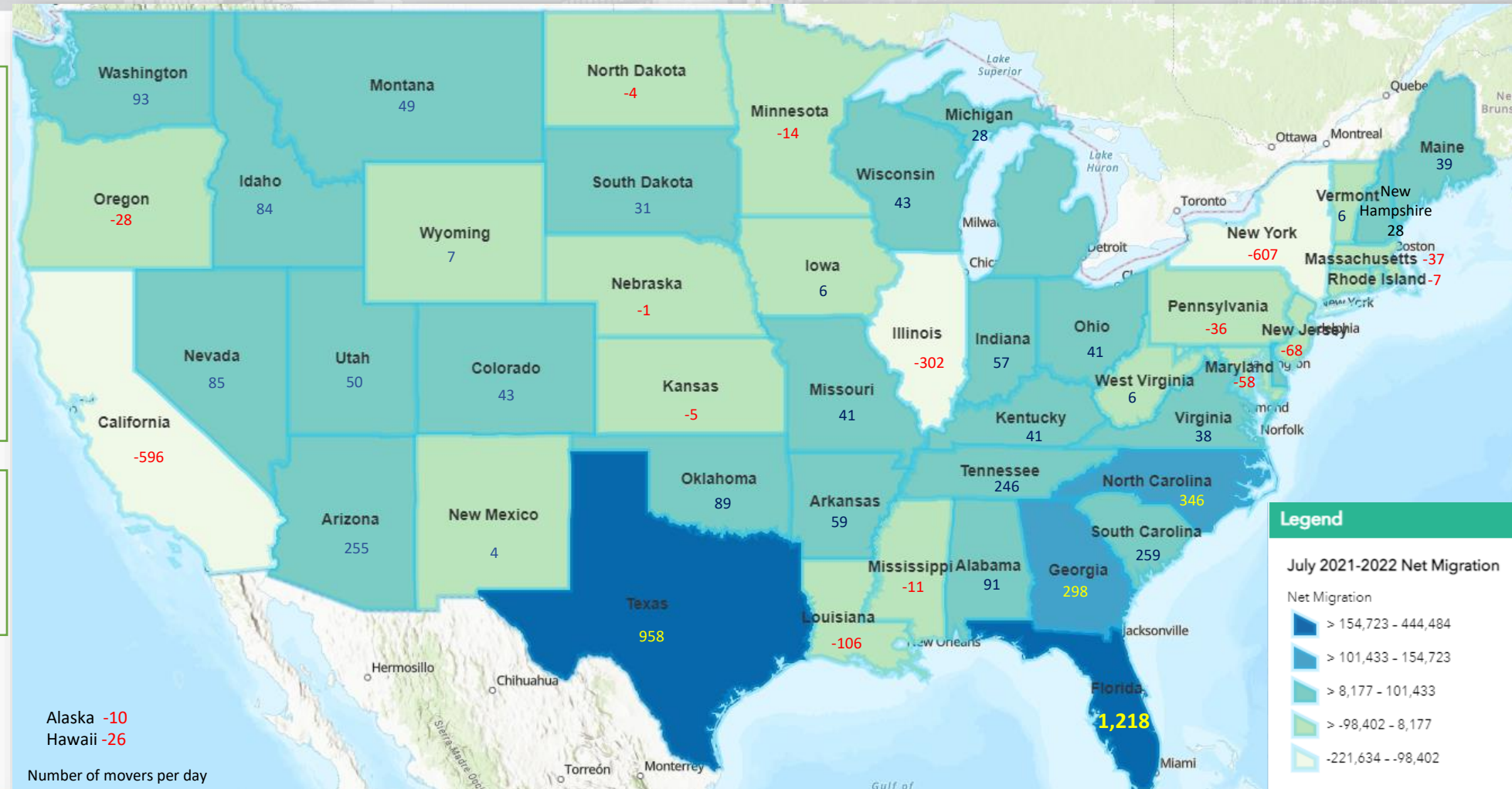
Net Migration Pattern by State

According to the U.S. Census [Florida](#) ranks:

- #1 in total net migration (444,484)
- #1 in domestic migration (318,855)
- #1 with the most people moving in per day (1,218)
- #2 in international migration (125,629) behind
 - #1 California (125,715)
- #3 in total population (22,244,823) behind
 - #1 California (39,029,342)
 - #2 Texas (30,029,572)

States showing the most negative domestic migration:

- California (-343,230)
- New York (-299,557)
- Illinois (-141,656)

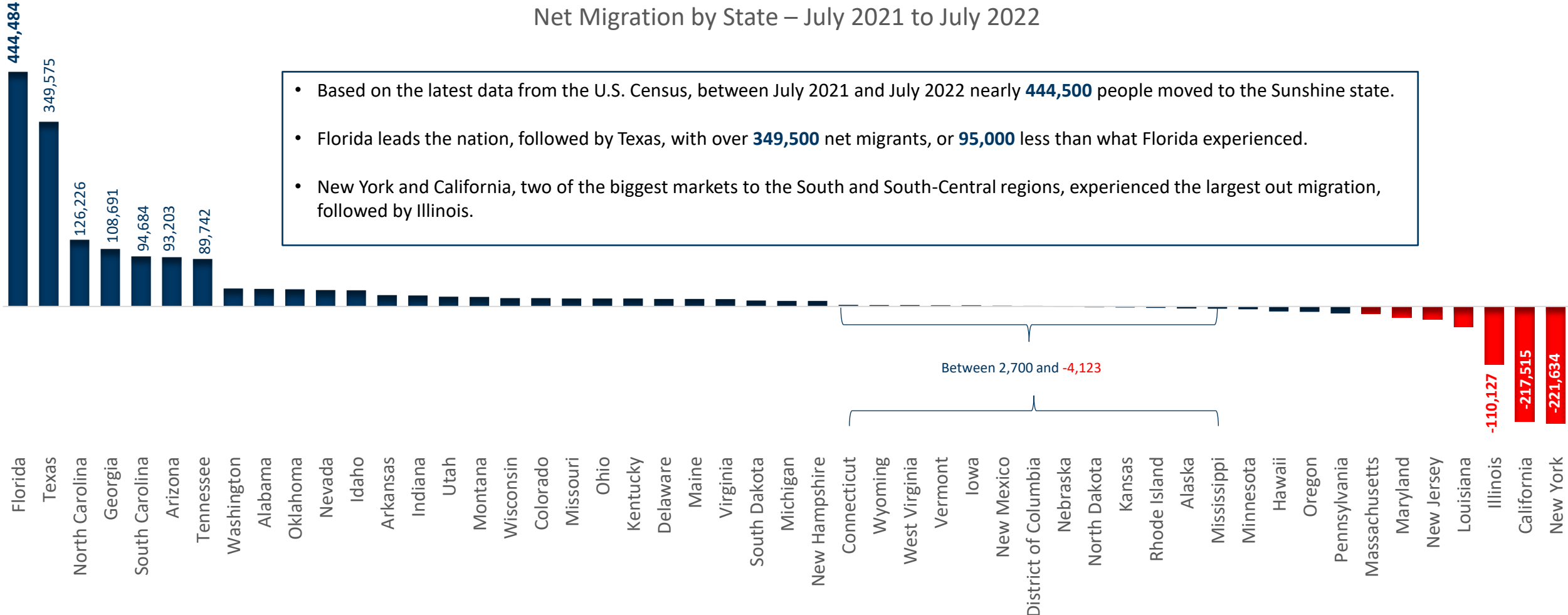

Net Migration is Strong in Florida Compared to Other States

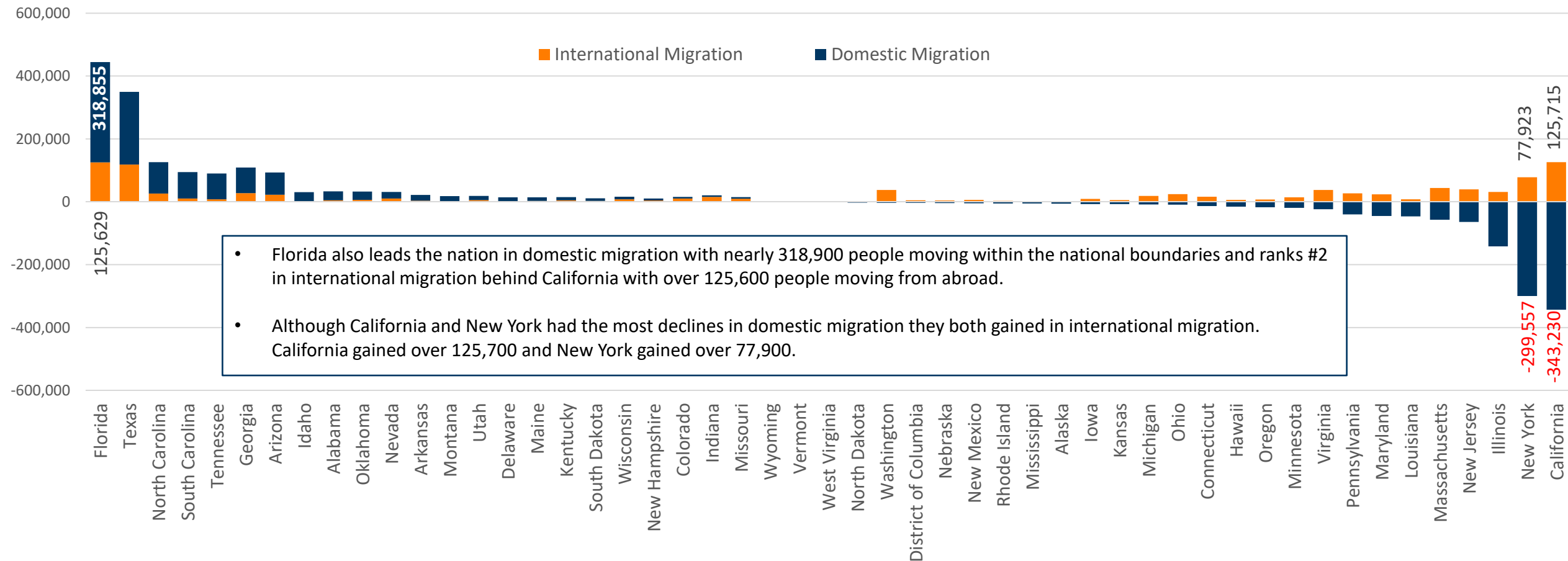
Net Migration by State – July 2021 to July 2022

- Based on the latest data from the U.S. Census, between July 2021 and July 2022 nearly **444,500** people moved to the Sunshine state.
- Florida leads the nation, followed by Texas, with over **349,500** net migrants, or **95,000** less than what Florida experienced.
- New York and California, two of the biggest markets to the South and South-Central regions, experienced the largest out migration, followed by Illinois.



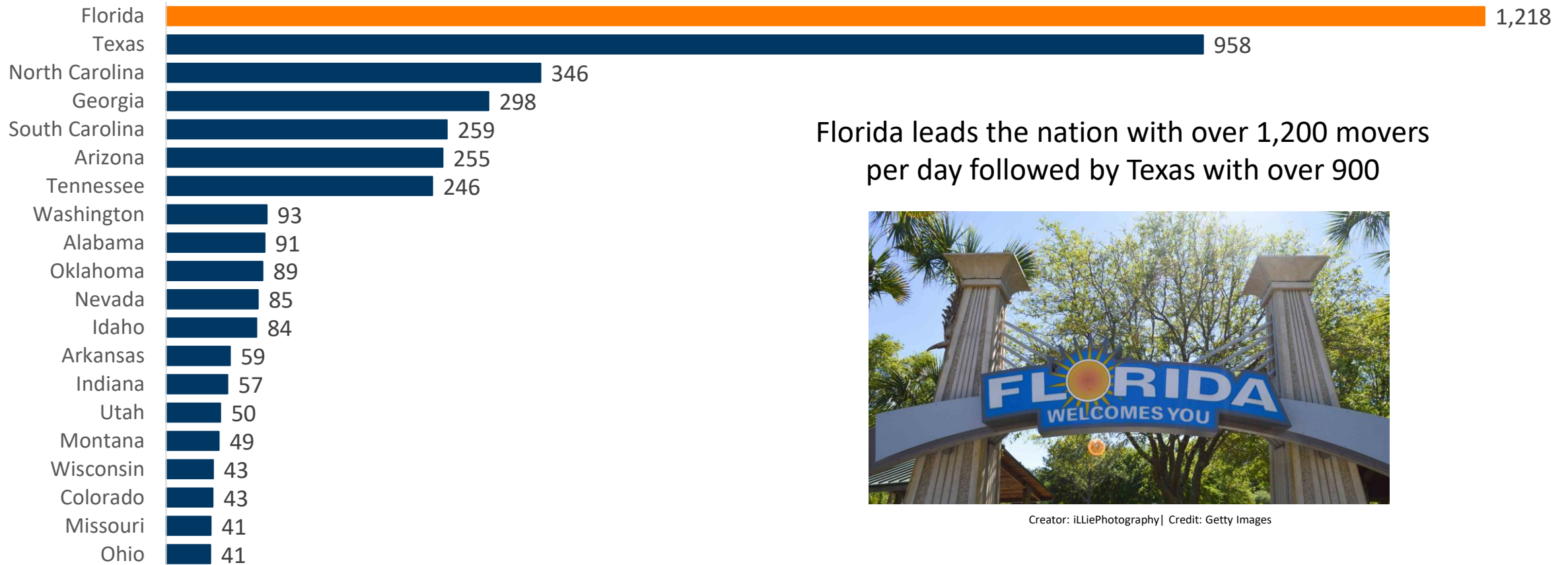
Domestic vs International Migration by State

Florida leads the nation with over 1,200 movers per day followed by Texas with over 900

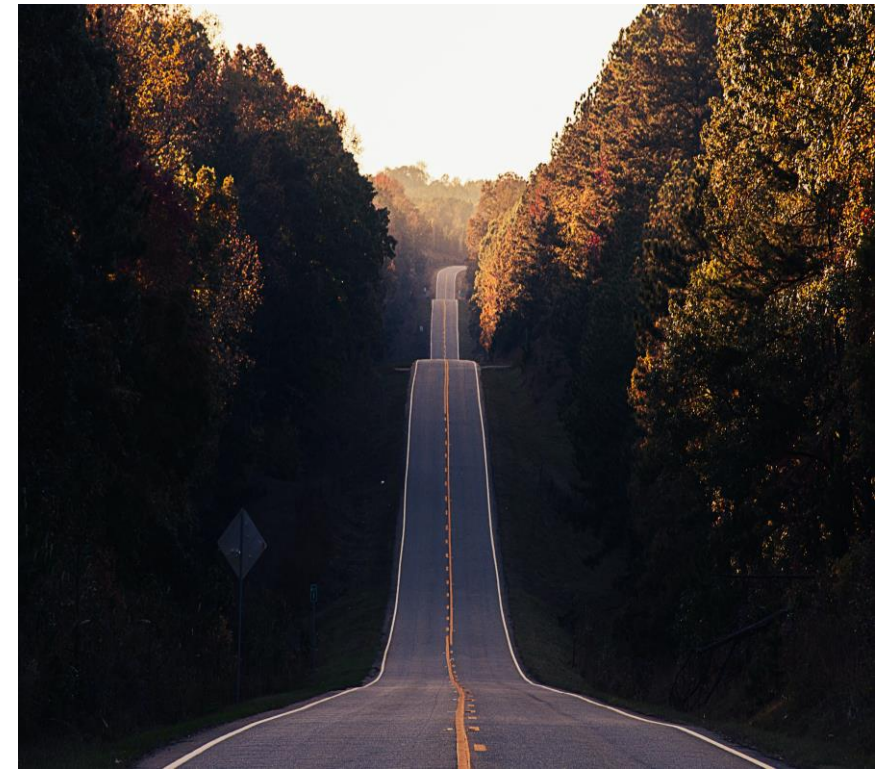
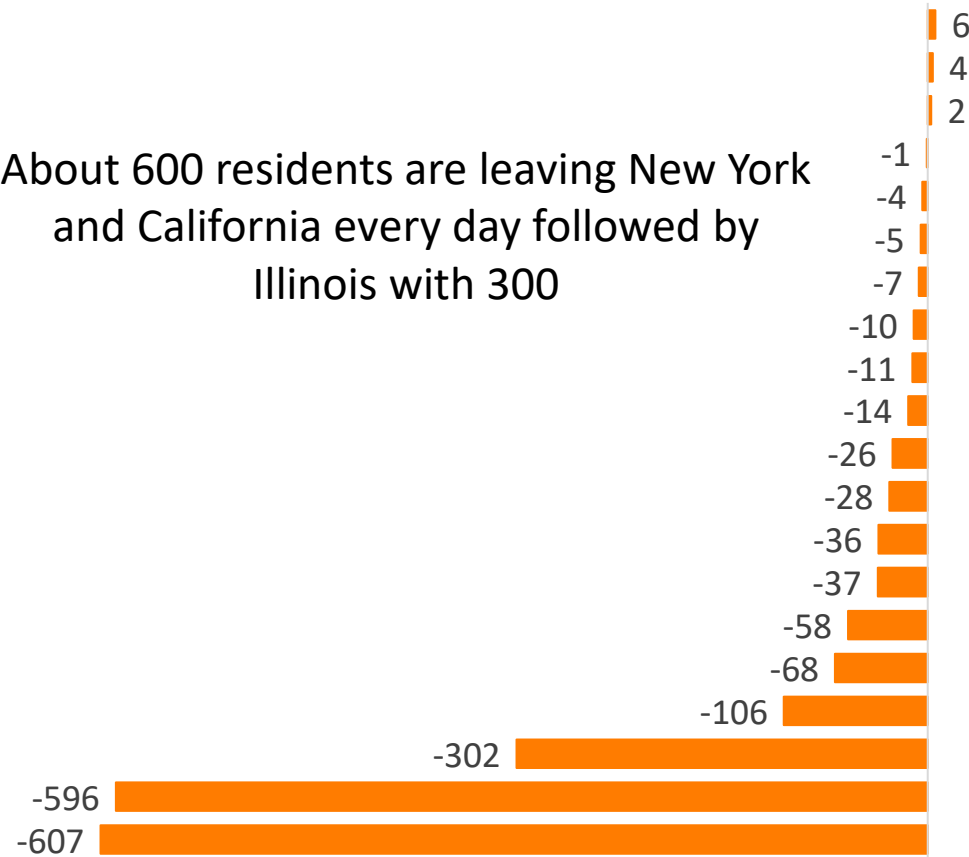

Florida Total Net Migration Trend

From 2013 to 2016 net migration continued to climb, with the largest gains of over **70,600** movers between 2014 and 2015

Between 2021 and 2022 Florida saw the largest year-over-year impact of residents moving – for a gain of **185,000**
